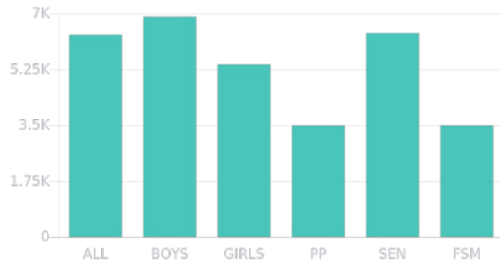

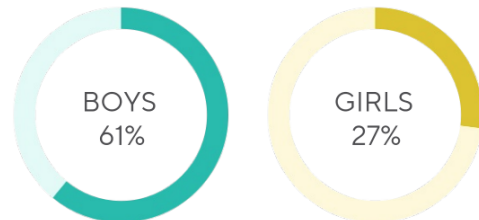

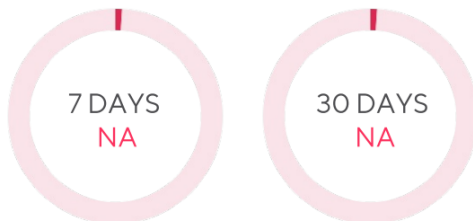

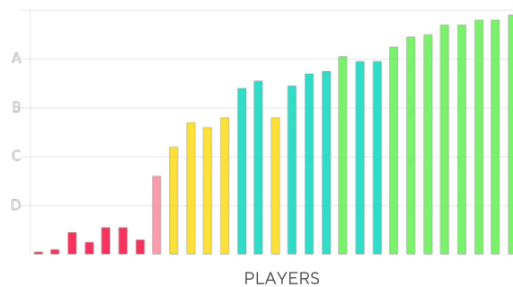

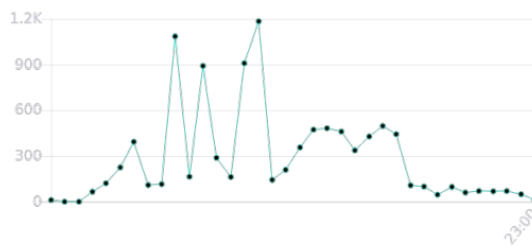

Cycling proficiency with Sustrans (pupil voice)

We have been working with Dave Davies from Sustrans throughout spring and summer terms. Developing cycling proficiency and confidence with our KS2 children, there was a particular focus on ensuring all of Year 6 were able to access our cycle to camp activity. Mr Davies also ran an after school club in each term to target specific children, see below for some quotes from children who attended one of our after school cycle clubs.

Lexi - 'really good fun, I can now ride really fast'. When asked if she felt more confident & looked forward to the sessions she replied yes to both.

Antony - 'really fun, Dave taught me to stand up on my bike'

Bella - 'really good'. When asked if she felt more confident and looked forward to the sessions, she replied yes to both.

Henry - 'really enjoy it, I hope it continues. Dave has helped me to go up curbs'.

Impact of PE & Sports Premium Funding on pupils' PE & sport participation

The sports premium funding has greatly impacted our ability to offer children at Trevithick a variety of sporting opportunities. Our employment of a specialist PE Coordinator has developed our sports offer in a variety of ways. We have increased our number of intra school competitions. We currently run inter house competitions that involve a range of year groups throughout the year, this year we were able to run Year 3/4 football, Year 5/6 tag rugby, football & athletics (KS1 & 2).

We have sustained high levels of participation since the appointment of our PE coordinator. Following COVID-19 and our return to school sport, we have seamlessly returned to high levels of school participation, this continued in this academic year where we have taken part in 52 competitive & participatory events. We hosted 5 of our own events, including our SEND Trevictus Games events in June. We organised the local alliance football league again & hosted two girls football festivals (Sept '22 & May '23). We also organised our first ever Venture MAT 'X Games'.

Our Venture MAT 'X Games' included St Issey school & saw all of Year 5/6 children offered opportunities to participate in a variety of extreme sports, including BMX, skateboarding, scottering, surfing, parkour, bouldering & tobogganing! We used this opportunity to build links with local community clubs such as West Coast cheerleading, Cornwall BMX & Mount Hawke skatepark. This gave us an opportunity to allow children to experience different activities, challenge themselves and try something they've never had a chance to before! It also provided us with an opportunity to build links & re engage with other local community sports clubs.

We have continued our dazzling health homework and have seen a high level of involvement, particularly amongst our KS1 children. The optional homework has encouraged healthy habits outside of school & these have been rewarded & celebrated through certificates & sporting prizes. The PE coordinator created an active advent calendar for classes & families to participate in at home & in school during December 2022 in addition to

previously creating an active version of the snakes & ladders game to be used during wet breaks & any other opportunities.

We have continued to replenish our equipment throughout the year to allow us to continue to provide children with opportunities to experience a range of sporting opportunities within the school day. We have ensured we have sufficient kit to enable multiple classes to access PE and physical activity on the same day which had become an occasional barrier due to our increasing school numbers.

In recent years, our PE coordinator has also looked to extend our school sports offer by offering enrichment opportunities. Visiting professional sports events/fixtures, with the aim of broadening the children's experiences and inspiring their own sporting interests. This academic year we attended a 'Super Saturday' experience with Exeter Chiefs rugby club, where we trained, toured the facilities & watched them play against the Vodacom Bulls in a European fixture (Dec 2022). We visited Wolverhampton Wanderers in February 2023 where we took part in a training session at the Sir Jack Hayward training facility, led by an academy coach. We watched Wolves V Liverpool in the Premier League and had a stadium tour at Molineux. We also provided a Year 3/4 trip opportunity by visiting our local professional rugby team - the Cornish Pirates. We took part in training, formed a guard of honour pre match & played on the pitch at half time, either side of watching them win their match against Coventry. We were successful in the school ballot for the Wimbledon Tennis championships and took eight children to watch round 3 action on Court No.1 on Friday 7th July. Our final planned enrichment trip to Somerset CC for years 4 & 5 children was cancelled due to the predicted weather forecast in Taunton (11.07.23).

Our use of a specialist PE coordinator has enabled us to really raise the profile of PE and school sport across the school, the PE coordinator seeks a wide range of opportunities to support the growth and success of the subject area. Examples of this include our involvement with the London Mini Marathon this year where we involved Years 5/6. As part of this initiative, we took Year 5 & 6 children off site to complete their 2.6 mile runs in the local area (woodland, coast path & mining trail). Our high levels of sporting participation and competition entry in addition to our sporting enrichment trips all form a key part of our extensive school sports offer.

With reference to our three main objectives for the 2022/23 PE and sports premium funding, we believe we have met our objectives - we have returned to high levels of school sporting opportunities, both internally & externally. We have participated in more football fixtures than ever before and have built on our SEND opportunities with support from David Painter at Cornwall Cricket (table cricket deliverer). We have ensured participation despite transport barriers and have liaised regularly with Camborne School to secure their minibuses when needed (particularly important in the summer term). The PE coordinator has met regularly with PE teaching staff to support and answer any questions that arise regarding the PE curriculum.

The impact of the various objectives we have set ourselves sees many children participate in and enjoy different sporting and physical activities. Our children develop a wide range of skills that enable them to grow as individuals. The children develop physically, emotionally and socially, they learn about themselves and what they enjoy. The majority are open to new experiences and environments which support their development as individuals, our PE & school sport offer here at Trevithick is continually developing with the support of the PE & Sports grant.

- Continue to enable a broad range of physical activities to be accessed internally and externally.
- To provide inclusive SEND sporting opportunities, including within our KS1 cohort.
